Goal Statement

By the end of the performance period, HDIS data for the CA-524 will show 2025 total people accessing services who are experiencing homelessness annually, representing 63 fewer people and a 3% reduction from the baseline.

Goal Narrative

We anticipate a 3% reduction in the number of people accessing services over the next 3 years. We will accomplish this through increased homelessness prevention activities, improved housing stabilization services to reduce re-entry into the system, and targeting those with chronic episodes of homelessness for inclusion in housing services.

Our 2021 APR for Coordinated Entry shows 1058 out of 3334 people indicate that they have a mental health disorder. That is 32% of our homeless population over the course of a year.

CountyHealthRankings.org indicates 15% of the general population in Sutter and Yuba Counties report "frequent mental distress". With this disparity, we target those who indicate a mental health condition to connect this population to shelter, increase their exits to permanent housing, shorten their length of time homeless, and prevent their homelessness from occurring.

We will monitor the number and percentage of people who disclose a mental illness who are:

- 1. Connected to ES
- 2. Exit to PH or PSH
- 3. Provided homelessness prevention services

1b. Reducing the number of persons experiencing homelessness on a daily basis

Goal Statement

By the end of the performance period, data for the CA-524 will show 755 total people experiencing unsheltered homelessness daily, representing 84 fewer people and a 10% reduction from the baseline.

Goal Narrative

We anticipate a 10% reduction in the number of people experiencing unsheltered homelessness. We will accomplish this by adding emergency shelter, sobering, and medical recouperative care beds through the addition of CalAIM.

By the end of the performance period, HDIS data for the CA-524 will show 1194 total people become newly homeless each year, representing 211 fewer people and a 15% reduction from the baseline.

We anticipate a reduction of 15% over three years in people who become newly homeless. We will accomplish this by conducting continuous quality improvement in the homelesness prevention system.

Describe Your Related Goals for Underserved Populations and Populations Disproportionately Impacted by Homelessness

Describe any underserved and/or disproportionately impacted population(s) that your community will especially focus on related to this Outcome Goal and how this focus has been informed by data in your landscape assessment:

Based on the HUD CoC Analysis Tool, multi-racial persons and Black/African American individuals experience homelessness at twice the rate of their representation in the total population. Data indicates that 24% of persons experiencing homelessness are multi-racial compared to census data reporting that 12% of the total population are multi-racial; 9% of persons experiencing homelessness are Black compared to 3% of the total population. The Consortium will identify strategies to focus prevention measures on at-risk multi-racial and Black individuals and families to reduce the likelihood that these individuals will experience first time homelessness.

Describe the trackable data goal(s) related to this Outcome Goal:

We will monitor the number and percentage of multi-racial and Black/African American individuals who request and receive homelessness prevention support.

3. Increasing the number of people exiting homelessness into permanent housing.

Goal Statement

By the end of the performance period, HDIS data for the CA-524 will show 706 total people people exiting homelessness into permanent housing annually, representing 141 more people and a 25% increase from the baseline.

Goal Narrative

We anticipate a 25% increase in the number of people exiting homelessness into permanent housing. We will do this by working with partners to increase affordable housing in the region and providing robust training to rapid rehousing partners.

Based on 2019 PIT Data, Hispanic/Latino persons account for 14% of the total homeless population. However, based on StellaP data from 10/1/20 - 9/30/21, Hispanic persons only represented 4% of those who entered into permanent housing.

Describe the trackable data goal(s) related to this Outcome Goal:

We will monitor the number and percentage of Hispanic/Latino persons exiting homelessness into permanent housing.

4. Reducing the length of time persons remain homeless.

Goal Statement

By the end of the performance period, HDIS data for the CA-524 will show 90 days as the average length of time that persons are enrolled in street outreach, emergency shelter, transitional housing, safehaven projects and time prior to move-in for persons enrolled in rapid rehousing and permanent housing programs annually, representing 31 fewer people and a 24% reduction from the baseline.

Goal Narrative

We anticipate a 24% decrease in the length of time persons remain homeless. We will accomplish this by working with partners to increase affordable housing in the region an dproviding robust training to rapid rehousing partners.

StellaP data indicates American Indian/Alaskan persons remain in the homeless system 36 days longer (average of 173 days) than all households (average of 137 days) showing an 26% discrepancy.

Describe the trackable data goal(s) related to this Outcome Goal:

We will monitor the number of days homeless experienced by American Indian/Alaskan persons.

5. Reducing the number of persons who return to homelessness within two years after exiting homelessness to permanent housing.

Goal Statement

By the end of the performance period, HDIS data for the CA-524 will show 4% of people return to homelessness within 2 years after having exited homelessness to permanent housing, representing 2% fewer people and a 33% reduction from the baseline.

Goal Narrative

We anticipate a 33% reduction in the percentage of people who return to homelessness after 2 years. We will accomplish this by improving housing retention strategies including outreach to recently housed individuals, incentives for success, and assistance in obtaining and retaining housing choice vouchers. It should be noted that baseline data is for 6 months, and not two years. Two year data was not provided for this goal and we were instructed to use the 6 month data.

Based on the supporting data provided by CallCH for HHAP-4 goal development, people who are multiple races AND Hispanic/Latino have a 100% rate of return to homelessness. We will specifically target this group of people to ensure their longevity of housing placement success.

Describe the trackable data goal(s) related to this Outcome Goal:

We will monitor number and percentage of people who are Multiple Races AND Hispanic/Latino who receive housing retention support and who return to homelessness after housing placement.

Goal Statement

By the end of the performance period, HDIS data for the CA-524 will show 300 total people served in street outreach projects exit to emergency shelter, safe haven, transitional housing, or permanent housing

destinations annually, representing 291 more people and a 3233% increase from the baseline.

Goal Narrative

We anticipate a 3233% increase in successful placements from street outreach. We will do this by ensuring accurate data quality, training street outreach agencies on when to exit from HMIS.

Describe Your Related Goals for Underserved Populations and Populations Disproportionately Impacted by Homelessness

Describe any underserved and/or disproportionately impacted population(s) that your community will especially focus on related to this Outcome Goal and how this focus has been informed by data in your landscape assessment:

Based on the HUD CoC Analysis Tool, multi-racial youth experience unsheltered homelessness at a higher rate than average. 36% of the homelessness youth are unsheltered, while 85% of multi-racial youth are unsheltered. The Analysis Tool also indicates that Black/African American adults represent 9% of persons experiencing homelessness, but 17% of persons experiencing unsheltered homelessness. Strategies to encourage Black/African American persons experiencing unsheltered homelessness to access shelter or permanent housing will be developed.

Describe the trackable data goal(s) related to this Outcome Goal:

We will monitor the number and percentage of Black/African American persons and multi-racial youth who are assisted through Street Outreach who exit to emergency shelter or permanent housing.

Increasing investments into, or otherwise scaling up, specific interventions or program types

Description

1.1 Limit first-time homelessness by decreasing evictions:

Integrate Prevention/Diversion into the Coordinated Entry System. Target prevention assistance to those most at risk of homelessness. Implement best practices in prevention/diversion programs. Create connections with landlords to encourage alternatives to eviction. Educate residents at risk of eviction of rights and resources available.

1.2 Prevent returns to homelessness:

Provide wrap-around support with every housing placement. Increase and improve access to behavioral health/substance use treatment and services. Develop mechanisms to increase income and reduce expenses for households.

2.1 Improve permanent housing interventions for people exiting homelessness:

Expand capacity to provide support services to prevent returns to homelessness by people who have exited from homelessness to permanent housing. Provide direct tenancy support services and/or training for providers to support clients with housing navigation and completing applications and housing retention services. Services will include crisis intervention, health and safety visits, independent living skills development, unit habitability inspections, and resolving disputes with landlords.

2.2 Improve temporary housing interventions for people at-risk of homelessness:

Expand capacity to help people who are at-risk of homelessness stabilize in housing. This can include training to implement CoC standards for homeless prevention, conflict resolution training, and flexible funding to address urgent needs.

2.3 Expand Coordinated Entry capacity:

Expand the hours of operation and improve service delivery at Coordinated Entry sites.

July 1, 2022 - June 30, 2025

Sutter Yuba Homeless Consortium (SYHC) is receiving short-term consulting services from the Yuba County Public Health Officer and Epidemiologist to lay a foundation for consistent, quality data collection. SYHC has requested HHIP funds from our regional Managed Care Plans to assist in sustaining this effort.

(III) Increasing capacity for pooling and aligning housing and services funding from existing, mainstream, and new funding.

Identify regional champions to increase awareness of best practices in pooling and aligning fund, to include providing training to local partners, presentations on flex pool, and requesting technical assistance.

(IV) Improving homeless point-in-time counts.

Reviewing and implementing HUD's requirements for PIT, including detailing methodology.

(V) Improving coordinated entry systems to strengthen coordinated entry systems to eliminate racial bias, to create a youth-specific coordinated entry system or youth-specific coordinated entry access points, or to improve the coordinated entry assessment tool to ensure that it contemplates the specific needs of youth experiencing homelessness.

HHAP-2 funding is being used to support a full-time homeless liaison position through Yuba County Office of Education and the Coordinated Entry System. This position will work to fill data gaps and assist unaccompanied youth in navigating services available to them. The Coordinated Entry Vulnerability Assessment tool is being revised to streamline the process of prioritization and program matching.

Help drive progress toward achievement of the Outcome Goals and Goals for Underserved Populations and Populations Disproportionately Impacted by Homelessness (as identified in Part II above):

Outcome goals include reducing the number of persons experiencing homelessness, reducing unsheltered homelessness, reducing the number of newly homeless persons, increasing exits to permanent housing, reducing length of time homeless, reducing returns to homelessness, and increasing successful exits from street outreach. One significant underlying barrier to each of these goals is the availability of shelter, housing, prevention, and case management. By increasing capacity for programs administering rapid rehousing, interim shelter, and prevention activities, we can move the needle on each of these goals.

Help address racial inequities and other inequities in the jurisdiction's homelessness response system:

The inequities seen in the local homelessness response system are centered around exits to permanent housing, indicating a need to target these particular populations for additional services. By increasing capacity for rapid rehousing and shelter, as indicated in the funding plan in table 6, we will be able to increase services for the populations experiencing inequities (American Indian/Alaska Native and Multiple Races) and reduce the identified disparities.

Be aligned with health and behavioral health care strategies and resources, including resources of local Medi-Cal managed care plans:

The managed care plans serving Yuba County are entering into agreements with the Sutter Yuba Homeless Consortium to assist in meeting their goal of addressing homelessness through prioritizing housing support services for their members experiencing homelessness. These objectives speak directly to members becoming successfully housed and retaining housing over time. Our funding priorities of rapid rehousing and homelessness prevention are in alignment with the priorities of the managed care plans, and strategies identified through CalAIM implementation.

Support increased exits to permanent housing among people experiencing homelessness:

By investing in interim shelter and rapid rehousing, we can ensure supports are available to people experiencing homelessness that will improve their success in exiting to permanent housing. Bother shelter and rapid rehousing programs embed a case management component that addresses barriers to obtaining housing. In our experience, most of the people we serve are not experiencing homelessness solely due to a lack of housing. Oftentimes there are significant barriers that limit exits from homelessness including poor credit history, rental history, income, substance use and behavioral health conditions. Our investments will expand current resources to serve additional households, and assist them in obtaining permanent housing.
