## Cal ICH Advisory Committee Meeting November 6, 2023

## ITEM III. Feedback from Council on Advisory Committee Recommendations

This document is a follow up to the memo <u>Recommendations from Members of the</u> <u>Advisory Committee on Strengthening Implementation of State Homelessness Funding</u> <u>and Programs</u>. The recommendations were presented by members of the Advisory Committee to the Council during their meeting on September 7, 2023. Council members were asked if they had any questions, clarifications, or additional information they would like to see about the initial recommendations.

Council member comments are compiled here and listed with the most related recommendation. Not all recommendations were discussed at the Council meeting. Council Staff have also listed potential groups related to Cal ICH that could help move each recommendation forward. These include various Cal ICH Action Plan Working Groups, teams within Cal ICH, or others that may have purview over the specific recommendation. Some recommendations may be outside of the purview of Cal ICH and would need to be discussed by other bodies, such as the State Legislature. The goal of this document is to facilitate conversation among the Advisory Committee about how to make the recommendations actionable across homelessness policies in the State.

As a reminder, the Council and its bodies can develop and inform policy using various methods, including:

- **Funding**: Streamline funding across State Departments and Agencies. Utilize Working Groups to coordinate targeting, prioritization, and incentive strategies of new and existing funding.
- **Communication**: Use communication strategies to message Council vision, increase focus on important topics, and adjust public thinking. Increase person-centered approaches.
- **Data:** Use data to inform State activities and encourage data-driven decisions, improve understanding of issues and strategies, and align metrics across state programs.
- Guidance, Toolkits, and Materials: Issue written guidance, toolkits, and materials to clarify policy, express priorities, and communicate options to support strong, evidence-based practices.
- **Amplification:** Highlight models, innovations, and examples of best practices for others to replicate and/or be inspired by. Recognize the work of successful initiatives.
- **Technical Assistance:** Recommend further assistance for targeted support to an agency, organization, or community with a development need or resource gap.
- Inform Decisionmakers: Provide guidance for the Governor and state legislature, as requested, to take action to drive progress via Executive Orders or legislative proposals that shape State and local activities.
